# 1 Marymound Campus Pelletier Hope Centre Home

### Project Team



Marymound Inc. is a youth and families social service organization founded by the Sisters of the Good Shepherd in 1911.

Their mission is to provide a continuum of care to support youth and families as they overcome, advance, and belong.



Prairie Architects Inc. is a Winnipeg based architecture firm and has led the design process.



Landmark Planning & Design Inc. is a land use planning and public engagement firm and has been retained to lead the planning and engagement process.



## 2 Marymound Campus

### Background

- The site was gifted to the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity of the Good Shepherd in 1911 and the Marymound Campus was opened as a justice diversion program for women in Winnipeg an unmet need.
  - It was formerly the Estate of Edward Leacock until it was abandoned.
- Over the last century, portions of the property were sold and various new structures were built as the institution grew.
- As the neighbourhood developed around the urban campus, Marymound became a facet of the community.
- There are several historical buildings on the campus, including the Leacock House, which has Heritage status in Winnipeg.









# 3 About Marymound





- Marymound is one of 15 health/social service organizations that comprise the Réseau Compassion Network.
- Marymound provides a continuum of services for youth:
  - Assessment and Treatment Programs.
  - Crisis Stabilisation Services.
  - Education and Vocational Programs.
  - A continuum of Healing and Placement Programs for youth in care.
  - Clinical Services.
  - Cultural Healing Services.
  - Therapeutic Programming.
  - Maternal and Early Childhood Services.
  - Sexual Abuse Treatment Services.
- Marymound is committed to addressing the gap in Manitoba's mental health and substance use services for youth and their families to help them overcome a challenging past, advance their education, and transition into adulthood.
  - Marymound serves more than 3,000 youth and their families each year.



# 4 About Marymound Neighbourhood Events & Activities

- Marymound is an active and involved member of the community and hosts various events, celebrations, and family activities throughout the year on their campus.
- These events and celebrations include barbeques, crafts, gardening, story telling, sports, and other programming.
- Most notably, their Indigenous Day festival brings more than 1,000 people to Marymound each year to celebrate First Nation and Métis culture, offering live entertainment, a traditional feast, games, pony rides, craft making, and more.













# 5 Commitment to Reconciliation

- Marymound uses a Reconciled Healing Model that combines traditional cultural interventions with Western therapeutic interventions.
  - They are supported by an Indigenous Advisory Circle.
- Nearly 85% of youth in Marymound's care are of Indigenous and Métis descent.

Marymound provides a cultural services program delivered by a Land-Based Cultural Coordinator, Cultural Program Coordinator, Elder-in-Residence, Knowledge Keeper, cultural mentors, and traditional healers from local First Nations and Métis communities.

The cultural services program helps youth to develop a connection to their culture and community, and to foster a positive identity as an Indigenous youth.



## 6 Project Intent





### Pelletier Hope Centre Home

### Healing Home Capital Campaign

- The Manitoba Advocate for Children and Youth has identified a need for live-in treatment in Manitoba.
- Marymound has undertaken a Capital Campaign for the creation of a Healing Home to support youth struggling with mental health and substance mis-use issues, trauma, and complex needs.
- The Pelletier Hope Centre Home will provide a warm and welcoming environment for youth to support their healing journey.
- This expansion of Marymound's facilities is proposed on the Marymound Campus at 442 Scotia Street.
- Most of the programming planned for the new facility is already taking place at this location, however the Hope Centre Home will provide continuity for youth from their previous treatment and allow them to maintain relationships and security fostered at Marymound.




### Site Context

- The Marymound Campus is +/- 7.8 acres in area and is bounded by the following:
  - North: Scotia Street and homes on Leila Avenue
  - East: Red River
  - West: Marymound Way
  - South: Forrest Avenue and Scotia Street
- The Project Team considers a variety of factors throughout the planning and design process, including:
  - Resident and Stakeholder Input
  - Existing Campus Layout and Uses
  - Heritage Status
  - Potential/Perceived Conflict with Neighbouring Residences
  - Setbacks and Privacy
  - Environmental Considerations
  - Site Access
  - Construction Nuisances







### Planning & Policy Context

- The subject site is currently zoned Residential Medium (R1-M).
  - A "care home" is a permitted use within the R1-M Zoning District up to a maximum of six beds.
  - In order to accommodate the proposed 12 bed Home, a Conditional Use and Variance application will be required.

### **Policy Direction**

- OurWinnipeg 2045 and Complete Communities 2.0 identify this site within an Established Neighbourhood intended to accommodate growth in a context sensitive manner.
- Both policy documents include several policies and objectives that support a project like this one, including to:
  - Build bridges spanning ideas, cultures, identities and generations on a foundation of truth, understanding and rights-based reconciliation; and
  - Accommodate a variety of public and institutional uses to meet a broad range of community needs.



# 9 Development Approach

Marymound has undertaken an extensive process to evaluate three approaches to accommodating the Pelletier Hope Centre Home within the Marymound Campus in collaboration with a team of architects, structural engineers, and construction managers.



#### **Approach 1**

Accommodate the Hope Centre Home within the Leacock House.

- Requires extensive renovation and restoration of both interior and exterior, including protected elements.
- Reconfiguration of interior.
- Extensive structural work required.



### **Approach 2**

Demolish the Leacock House to create room for the Pelletier Hope Centre Home in the preferred location.

- Delisting and demolition of Leacock House.
- Construction of new Hope Centre Home incorporating salvaged heritage elements from the Leacock House.



### **Approach 3**


Find an alternative location for the Hope Centre Home on campus.

- Consideration of alternate locations on site.
- Potential relocation of existing uses, memorials, and/or programming.
- Construction of new Hope Centre Home.
- Find funding to support restoration required for Leacock House to accommodate an alternate use.

# 11 Development Approach Analysis of Alternate Locations

### **Preferred Site & The Leacock House**

The new Pelletier Hope Centre Phase II Transition Home will be physically disconnected from the existing Priory building, but built in close proximity to maintain a functional relationship. The preferred site for the new Hope Centre Home overlaps the footprint of the existing Leacock House and would require it to be demolished.


The Leacock house is vacant and in need of significant repair, including a roof replacement. Many temporary repairs and short-term measures have been put in place, however Marymound does not have the funds for complete and proper repairs. Deterioration of the Leacock House is expected to continue. There is currently no fundable, compatible use to locate in the Leacock House for the foreseeable future.

If the Hope Centre could be located on the preferred site, it would benefit from the most privacy for the residents, little to no exposure to the community, and good separation from the existing school functions. It would be close to the commercial kitchen and existing building services used by the building's residents.

Additionally, the new building would have strong connections to the riverbank landscape and its associated cultural/recreational functions. This location offers the least likelihood of disruptive construction activity for both school and community, and necessitates only a small number of trees be removed. It would also leave enough space for Marymound to construct a workshop in the future.






- New, state of the art building.

- Provides live-in home that integrates a trauma informed approach of environmental settings for youth.
- Purpose built to support an Indigenous approach to healing.
- Classroom to support youth who are working up to a full day at Marymound School.








Aerial view of Marymound's Urban Campus with the proposed development.

## 15 Planning Process



#### 2015

Initiative for the Pelletier
Hope Centre Home began
with commitment of funding
by the Department of
Families.



#### 2019

Extensive renovation and restoration of the Leacock House deemed infeasible.

Following the first feasibility assessment, a second feasibility study was done exploring the renovation of exterior elements only.



#### May 2022

Application made to Historical Buildings and Resource Committee (HBRC) to remove the Leacock House from the List of Historical Resources By-law No. 55/2014.



#### August 2022

(July - August) Alternative options for the Pelletier Hope Centre Home explored by the project team.

Community Open House.



#### 2018

(2015 - 2018) Extensive fundraising via a Capital Campaign.

Retained Prairie Architects Inc.,
Crosier Kilgour & Partner, and Akman
Construction Ltd. to evaluate the
feasibility of renovating the Leacock
House to accommodate the Pelletier
Hope Centre Home.



#### March 2022

Second approach deemed unfeasible due to structural constraints and cost.

Landmark Planning & Design joined the Project Team.



#### **July 2022**

HBRC meeting to delist the Leacock House.



#### November 2022

(Potential) SPC Meeting
to appeal the HBRC
recommendation to delist the
Leacock House.

(Potential) Development
Application: Conditional Use
application to permit the
establishment of a "care home"
with 12 beds instead of 6 beds.
